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### **That Holiday Cheer Can Go the Wrong Way On Our Roads**

*Drunk Driving. Over the Limit. Under Arrest.*

[Milpitas, CA]— As party-goers celebrate the holidays with friends and family, everyone should heed The Milpitas Police Department's warning to keep the party off the road or be ready to face the consequences. Law Enforcement will be out in force beginning December 17<sup>th</sup> through the New Year's weekend cracking down on anyone caught drunk or drugged behind the wheel.

The Milpitas Police Department will be conducting a DUI/Driver License checkpoint in partnership with the Avoid DUI Task Force Campaigns and law enforcement nationwide on December 18<sup>th</sup> starting at 8:30 P.M. near the intersection of Main St. and Curtis Ave. in Milpitas.

"After hearing about the dangers of drinking and driving time after time, most people have gotten the message that if they're planning on drinking, they should always plan a safe way home," said Milpitas Police Chief Graham. "But sadly, millions of Americans still think they are invincible and regularly choose to get behind the wheel after having too much to drink. And passengers have a responsibility too. They should not get in a car with an intoxicated person behind the wheel, nor should they allow someone they know to drive off while under the influence."

The Milpitas Police Department said parents should take note that young males are at particularly high risk, with nearly one-quarter admitting to riding with someone who should not have been behind the wheel in the past year.

"We know that the holiday season can be one of the deadliest and most dangerous times on America's roadways due to an increase in drunk driving," said Chief Graham. "Don't let your 2010 end in an arrest or worse, injury or death. Remember, whether you've had way too many or just one too many, it's not worth the risk!"



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During last year's two and half week Winter Holiday campaign, 36 Californians were killed in crashes statewide with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher and another 1,168 were injured in alcohol involved wrecks.

Funding for this operation is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety; through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Chief Graham recommends these simple tips for a safe holiday season:

- Plan a safe way home before the festivities begin;
- Before drinking, designate a sober driver;
- If you're impaired, use a taxi, call a sober friend or family member, or use public transportation;
- If you happen to see a drunk driver on the road, don't hesitate to contact your local law enforcement;
- And remember, *Friends Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk*. If you know someone who is about to drive or ride while impaired, take their keys and help them make other arrangements to get to where they are going safely.
