**Seema Nair**, a woman resident and business owner, asked about programs to support small businesses. She had her own business in Milpitas, and was looking for programs to help her succeed in Milpitas, as a minority-owned and woman-owned business.

**Jeff Cech**, lived in Milpitas for 44 years and spoke about tennis courts on Yellowstone, where he liked to play. Other sports were also played there, including some Olympic sports. He proposed the City should build a complex underneath the tennis courts, to offer ping pong and badminton.

## ANNOUNCEMENTS

Councilmember Montano attended a recent Santa Clara Valley Water District meeting last month, regarding committees and restructuring. The district had many programs for rebates toward water conservation. She inquired further about use of gray water, at her home, and sought to find out from City staff what the costs would be at her home to implement that water use.

Mayor Esteves announced the Youth Advisory Commission was seeking donations of gently used youth sports equipment, to benefits sports groups and teams in Milpitas.

**PUBLIC HEARING**

**1. Update on the Transit Area Development Impact Fee** Planning Director Steve McHarris discussed the established Transit Area Development Impact Fee (TADIF) for the Transit Area Specific Plan projects. The fee was required to be reviewed every year or two, and at this meeting was proposed to be slightly increased to cover anticipated costs for public improvements in that area of the city under development. The residential TADIF per unit-fee would be increased by \$2,260 over the current \$30,000 amount.

Councilmember Gomez inquired about outreach staff had done to the development community, and Mr. McHarris responded with efforts his office had made to notify developers by mail and by direct contact with staff when developers were present at City Hall regarding their projects.

Vice Mayor Polanski asked for explanation of what the fees were used to benefit. Staff explained the funds were used on public infrastructure for items such as public streets, signs, light fixtures, medians, parks, utility undergrounding of lines, etc.

Mayor Esteves inquired about the established Community Facilities District and wanted to confirm these fees discussed were in addition to CFD money. Mr. McHarris replied yes, the TADIF was applicable to new developments, at the time building permits were issued.

Councilmember Gomez inquired why this needed to be an urgency action. Mr. McHarris deferred to remarks from the City's consultant, Mr. Tapa Banda, an economist from EPS Consultants, who explained the approach to calculating and appropriately allocating fees to cover the known and anticipated costs for the needed infrastructure.

Next, the Mayor opened the public hearing.

**Robert Marini**, Milpitas resident, said when the fee applied to a process or service, the City needed to identify the fee to the public. He wanted water and sewer fees on the agenda, stating new fees should be on the website for public's understanding.

**Jim Sullivan**, president of Sullivan Land Development, did receive a well written letter from City staff about these fee changes. He had followed up with the Planning Director and talked to him, asking when the new fee would be effective. In a yearly review, he noted that 600 units fewer were being built in the Transit Area than planned, with a change in the density average, units/acre. He suggested it would be nice to separate smaller units from larger, less dense homes when considering the difference in fees.

**Jeff Cech**, Milpitas resident, inquired about fixing up parks in Milpitas. He asked if the fee discussed for all parks or just new ones going in. He suggested that more tennis courts getting built would be nice.

Councilmember Gomez said there were different things you could do, with different size homes. He would not support this rate increase right now.

Vice Mayor Polanski asked if the City had looked at a tiered plan for the densities in the Transit Area. Mr. McHarris said he took a quick look at that, and it depended on how you look at fees philosophically. The fairest way was to impose fees, as currently applied, and that method continued to be supported.

Councilmember Giordano was in agreement with the fee structure, and she was especially pleased to hear from Mr. Sullivan at the public hearing.

## **JOINT MEETING**

### **1. CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor/Chair Esteves called to order the joint meeting of the City Council, Successor Agency to the Redevelopment Agency and the Economic Development Corporation at 8:08 PM, with all five members present.

3. Consider Terminating Standstill Agreement

City Manager Tom Williams explained that the request to terminate the current existing "standstill" agreement was placed on the agenda due to various factors. He provided recent history behind actions of several government entities, including the Milpitas Oversight Board.

On this date, the City had received a letter to the City Council from legal counsel to the Oversight Board requesting that the City entities not take any action, as recommended on the agenda. The City Manager suggested the City Council honor the request, and the matter may be continued to a date in the future if needed.

Councilmember Gomez commented on land uses, including the continuing need for a school in the Transit Area Specific Plan area, in the south end of Milpitas.

Vice Mayor Polanski remarked on ongoing litigation that was pending between the County and the City and other agencies. She asked when was the case with the County going to be heard in court and the City Attorney replied, it was scheduled on June 24.

Councilmember Giordano inquired what role Supervisor Dave Cortese played in these meetings and whether he had been helpful. Mr. Williams replied, in government there had in general been lots of talk about communication and transparency. However, Mr. Cortese was "missing in action;" while City staff and officials tried to reach out, the Supervisor refused to meet with staff and had offered no help. There was a lack of partnership displayed, the City Manager felt.

Mayor Esteves noted that he wanted to see a new park built as soon as possible.

Mayor Esteves invited audience members to comment.

**Jeff Cech**, a Milpitas resident, appreciated that the hills in Milpitas were not built upon. What they (City Council) did affected all the residents, and he appreciated the Council and what they did.

Motion: to not terminate the Standstill Agreement agreed upon in 2013 by the City of Milpitas, the Successor Agency to the former Milpitas Redevelopment Agency, the Milpitas Economic Development Corporation and the Milpitas Oversight Board, and to continue this topic to a date uncertain
