







Dear Council Members,

My name is Frank, I object legalize either sell or manufacture marijuana at Milpitas.

First, let me ask everybody here for a couple of simple questions.

1. How many of you have never getting drunk in your life?
2. How many of you have never had one drip of beer or alcohol at meal and then start driving?
3. Every Federal holiday, like Independence Day, labor day, New Year, what we have heard most from radio or news? Drive Safe, Do NOT Drunk Drive. And meanwhile it is not abnormal to see police have set up check up station scanning for drunk-drive.

Let's looking at scientific study and data from Centers For Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

- In 2016, 10,497 people died in alcohol-impaired driving crashes, accounting for 28% of all traffic-related deaths in the United States.¹

- Of the 1,233 traffic deaths among children ages 0 to 14 years in 2016, 214 (17%) involved an alcohol-impaired driver.¹

- In 2016, more than 1 million drivers were arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.³ That's one percent of the 111 million self-reported episodes of alcohol-impaired driving among U.S. adults each year (figure below).

- Drugs other than alcohol (legal and illegal) are involved in about 16% of motor vehicle crashes.⁴

- **Marijuana** use is increasing and 13% of nighttime, weekend drivers have marijuana in their system.⁵

- **Marijuana** users were about 25% more likely to be involved in a crash than drivers with no evidence of marijuana use, however other factors—such as age and gender—may account for the increased crash risk among marijuana users.⁴

- About 1 in 10 marijuana users will become addicted. For people who begin using before the age of 18, that number rises to 1 in 6.

Why all these still happening when drive under influence already prohibited by law?

Since 1930, along with ratification of Twenty-First Amendment, alcohol has gradually become legal. 80 years later today, people still cannot control themselves on using alcohol, and people are still doing things wrong even it is prohibited by law.

Refer to Pacific Institute For Research And Evaluation (PIRE), US adults drank too much and got behind the wheel about 112 million times in 2010. Though episodes of driving after drinking too much ("drinking and driving") have gone down by 30% during the past 5 years, it remains a serious problem in the US. Alcohol-impaired drivers* are involved in about 1 in 3 crash deaths, resulting in nearly 11,000 deaths in 2009.

Alcohol use and abuse is a cross-cutting issue impacting the public health, criminal justice, and public safety arenas. A highly regulated and legal product, alcohol nonetheless exacts a huge toll on society. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), excessive alcohol consumption cost the United States **\$223.5 billion** in 2006.

As of now, marijuana, which still being listed as illegal drug at Federal Level Schedule 1, which is for drugs have high potential for abuse and the potential to create severe psychological and/or physical dependence, some other example of drugs listed at Schedule 1 are: Heroin, LSD, Ecstasy, and Magic Mushrooms.

Next question we'd like to discuss here is: Is marijuana going to make our city BETTER?

The short answer is NO. Many people love talking about tax benefit from marijuana business. First, is highly debatable marijuana can increase city's tax revenue. We shall not only focus on how much revenue tax can collect from marijuana business, we shall also fully explore about extra city expenses caused. Compare to data from Colorado State, every dollar of tax collected from marijuana is cost 5-10 times more tax dollar expenses.

- Along with increased Disability and Workers' Compensation Claim.
 - In states with medical marijuana laws, Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) claims increased 9.9% post legalization [<http://www.nber.org/papers/w23862.pdf>].
 - Drug Testing: Due to the adverse side effects of marijuana use, such as lack of concentration, dizziness, headaches, and vomiting, drug testing in the workplace will become essential in order to ensure a safe and reliable workplace.
 - Public Safety: simple math, law enforce department have one more thing to regulate, to monitor, and it can anticipate that cannabis businesses can attract criminal activity such as burglary, theft, or more serious offenses. Not to mention the increasing DUI and traffic accident due to marijuana.
- Last but not least, we have NO tax regulation over marijuana now, which means the marijuana business have ZERO tax benefit to city VS UNLIMITED expenses and burden added to the city. Since the state have legalized recreational use of marijuana, and there are pot shops already running at San Jose, it is not inconvenient to purchase and suit any needs at city nearby, which keep our city continuing to be a better place to live!

I am here as father, object any means of method to bring marijuana into the city, for better Milpitas, for better environment, for our next generation!
